What is the Charter of Rights?

The Charter is a list of things informing how children should be treated when they come into the care of the Department for Child Protection (DCP) in Western Australia. All of these rights are important, however some might be more important to you than others.

What does it mean to come into care?

It means DCP is responsible for your wellbeing. Your case worker works along side you and your carer to ensure you are being properly looked after, and that your care plan is being followed. The plan includes things like where you live, the school you go to, the sports and activities you take part in and your other day-to-day needs including contact with your family.

Children come into DCP care for different reasons. It is important that you understand why you are in care and how long you will be in care. Ask your case worker or carer if you are not sure.
